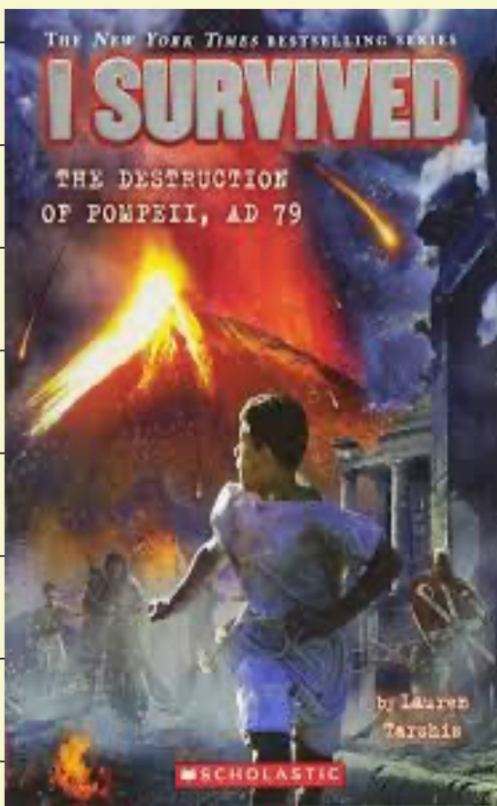

LI: To use apostrophes to show possession

Success Criteria

I can use a singular apostrophe for possession (cat's tail- one cat)

I can use the plural apostrophe for possession (cats' tails- more than one cat)

I can place an 's at the end of the subject where the word does not end in an -s- e.g. children's writing.

I can place a single apostrophe if the subject ends with an -s- e.g: cats' tails

Possessive apostrophes

An apostrophe can be used to show that one thing **belongs** to or is **connected** to something. This is called a **possessive apostrophe**.

Apostrophe for Possessives:

Amy's ballet class.
The parents' bedroom.
The children's rooms.



What are the rules for showing possession?

What do we do when the word ends in s?

Let's take a look at some examples.

The cat's tail was fluffy.

Marcus' s cat was naughty.

Cats' tails.

L1: To use apostrophes to show possession

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- I can place a single apostrophe if the subject ends with an -s- e.g: cats' tails

****1** : the condition of having or owning something The will is in my **possession**. **2** : something that is held by someone as property a valuable **possession**.

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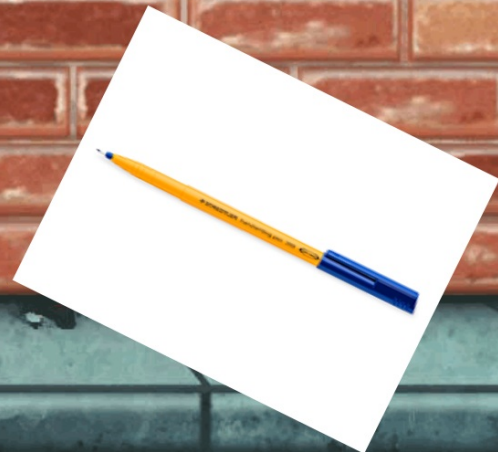
